Punishment And The Defiant Student

If punishment is to be used for a defiant student, make sure you handle the situation with care. Do not make a bad situation even worse.

Listed below are things that should be avoided when dealing with the defiant student.

- 1. Making too much of a minor incident. Do not over-react or create a situation just to make a point.
- 2. Sending too many offenders to the principal. Try to handle as many offenders as possible. If you let someone else handle all of your problems, it will send a signal of weakness to your students.
- 3. Frequent repetition of the punishment. If you use the same punishment all the time, sooner or later it will lose its effectiveness.
- 4. Lowering grades as punishment. This is unfair to the student's academic success. Remember, grades measure achievement, not behavior.
- 5. Harshness. Do not humiliate the student. Justice should be shown with kindness.
- 6. Shouting. The teacher should preserve dignity at all times. Shouting brings the teacher down to the level of the disruptive student. In some cases, this is just what the student wants.
- 7. Holding grudges. Forget what happened in the past. Once punishment has been administered, the case should be closed.
